Discovery Map

Situated in North West England, covering 803 square kilometres (300 sq miles) of rural Lancashire and North Yorkshire, the Forest of Bowland AONB is in two parts.

The famous landmark of Pendle Hill is geologically linked to the main upland block but separated by the broad valley of the River Ribble. The area surrounding this outlier is known locally as the Forest of Pendle, whilst being under the umbrella of the Forest of Bowland Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty title and designation.


There are several towns surrounding the Forest of Bowland AONB offering the perfect 'gateway' to explore the area, often with easy access to amenities and transport links.

Landscape and Heritage



Whitendale

The Forest of Bowland Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) is a nationally protected landscape and is internationally important for its heather moorland, blanket bog and rare birds.

The Landscape

There are 46 Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, designated for their precious landscape whose distinctive character and natural beauty are so outstanding that it is in the nation's interest to safeguard them. Designated an AONB in 1964, the Forest of Bowland is essentially an upland landscape, typified by its grandeur and isolation and forming part of the Pennines. Gritstone fells form the heart of the area with Ward's Stone (560m), Bowland Knotts (428m) and Clougha Pike (413m) providing the highest points with views over vast tracts of heather-covered grouse moor.

Surrounding this upland area the fringe is dissected by steep-sided valleys, often wooded and known locally as 'cloughs', which open out into the rich green lowlands of the Ribble, Hodder, Wyre and Lune Valleys. To the south-east, famous Pendle Hill (557m) stands proud, with views over Bowland's pastoral landscape where Tolkien penned much of Lord of the Rings.

History and Heritage

The medieval period had a great impact on the Forest of Bowland landscape. This controlling influence continued after the Forest laws were revoked in 1507, as deer parks and smaller estates replaced the hunting forests.

Managing the land for game hunting, primarily grouse shooting, has remained a predominant influence on the landscape, and several large private landowners remain today.

Wildlife and Habitats

The Forest of Bowland is particularly special for a number of upland bird species. The RSPB works closely with organisations like Natural England and United Utilities to help protect the rare hen harrier, merlin and ring ouzel, and also advises landowners and farmers to help them protect the nationally important populations of wading birds such as lapwing, snipe, curlew and redshank that nest on the in-bye grazing pastures each spring.

Villages

The AONB's population of just 16,000 live mostly in its historic villages, with the remainder in loose-knit hamlets or isolated dwellings in open countryside. Some are estate villages where buildings are of a similar age and architecture, for example Downham, Slaidburn and Abbeystead. Others are more haphazard farming settlements or industrial hamlets. Each has its own distinctive charm and sense of place.

Farming

The Forest of Bowland's traditional hay meadows and wet grasslands are also nationally important habitats. Many of the farms in the Forest of Bowland are managed under farming schemes. Good farming practices include management of traditional boundaries and buildings as well as cultivation of the land without fertiliser and with fewer or traditional livestock. It also includes the management of grassland, rush pasture and water 'scrapes' to encourage wading birds such as lapwing, curlew and redshank.

The BIO Bowland Transit Service

Regular services are provided to the following areas:

The B10/11 Bowland Transit route serves the beautiful Hodder Valley, via Waddington, Whitewell, Dunsop Bridge, Newton and Slaidburn. On Sundays the Pendle Witch Hopper (70/71) goes to Pendleton and Barley for the ascent of Pendle Hill and weekdays Barley is accessible from Nelson and Clitheroe (P70/71).

To the west of the AONB lies the market town of Garstang, easily reached by the half hourly bus 40 between Preston and Lancaster. In the Lune Valley, the excellent Lune Villager (80/81) service provides superb local connections, seven days a week, running into the late evening, from Lancaster to Caton and Hornby, with some services going through to Wray and Wennington and a more limited service to Bentham and Ingleton in North Yorkshire.



Walking





The Forest of Bowland offers some of the most beautiful and remote walking in the country, from the grandeur and isolation of the moorland hills to the undulating lowlands with their distinctive pattern of settlements, woodland cloughs and river valleys. These landscape contrasts, along with the serenity and tranquility of the area make this a walkers' paradise.

As well as the fell tops and moors, there are extensive opportunities for shorter and less challenging routes in the valleys, most especially riverside walks which abound in the area.

Look in the walking section of the Forest of Bowland website for a variety of walks - from family rambles to full day walks based from villages and long distance routes such as the Ribble Way or the Pendle Way.

There are a number of special interest walks, including routes that showcase some of the very best wildlife watching opportunities in the area – look out for the wildlife symbol. **www.forestofbowland.com/walking_routes**

Access Land

Open Access land is marked by the symbol above. In the Forest of Bowland AONB open access land offers some of the roughest and most remove walking in the North West, and linked with the network of public rights of way, gives plenty of scope for enjoyable and challenging walks. Walking on open access land can be challenging, as you may be a long way from recognised paths or obvious landmarks. As a large percentage of the access land is open moorland, good navigation skills and suitable clothing are required.

The latest editions of 1:25000 Ordnance Survey maps show access land and the Harvey Map of the area also shows access points. Occasionally notices will appear on site to notify the public of restrictions or closures. For further information about access land visit



Outstanding scenery, picturesque villages, charming tea rooms and a network of quiet lanes - all waiting to be explored. And what better way to do it than by bike? Silently travelling around this area of outstanding natural beauty under your own power, coming across hidden gems around every corner, this truly is a spectacular area for biking enthusiasts of all types and levels.

Gisburn Forest Mountain Bike Trails

Gisburn is the largest forest in Lancashire and is managed by Forest Enterprises. Within the forest, adjacent to Stocks reservoir, you'll find several colour coded mountain bike trails which can be accessed from designated car parks. There is a green, easy route for beginners, a 20km red, difficult route and 8.5km blue, moderate route with additional loops of black graded route. The singletrack swoops through the forest with many berms (banked turns); there are rocky sections and a long boardwalk section. Volunteers, cycle enthusiasts and

others, built nearly 2 km of singletrack and this section is a particular favourite. There are also many routes within the forest that are not singletrack that are also suitable for walkers and/or horseriders. Please observe the waymarking! Whether you cycle, walk or ride, you are bound to impressed by the peace and tranquillity of the forest and it's changing seasons and variety of wildlife. Lancashire Cycleway

Listed amongst the top 10 long distance cycle rides in Britain! The route consists of a north and south circular route which meet at the historic town of Whalley, to the south-east of the Forest of Bowland. Way of the Roses

The Way of the Roses is a new coast to coast route which links Morecambe in Lancashire, via the historic cities of Lancaster and York, to Bridlington in Yorkshire. The section which cuts through the Forest of Bowland AONB includes part of the Millennium Cycle way along the river Lune from Lancaster to Caton. Horse Riding

Imagine trekking along quiet tracks, cutting through the heart of some of most remote and beautiful parts of Bowland. Skirting picturesque farms and villages with a sense of stepping back in time to a forgotten part of the English countryside; and no better way to do it than by horse back.

Horse riding is growing in popularity and although there are currently no trekking centres within the AONB, there are opportunities to ride your own horse along a network of country lanes and bridleways.

North Lancashire Bridleway

The first phase of this ambitious project to develop a circular bridleway in Bowland is complete, offering 47km of bridleway that cuts through the heart of the Forest of Bowland AONB. The majority of accommodation available on the route is provided by working farms, with many offering livery for horses. The route travels from Halton on Lune near Lancaster before wending its way up the Roeburndale Valley over to Slaidburn and the Hodder Valley on the old Salter Fell Road, skirting Dunsop Bridge and Whitewell and finally on to Chipping.

Future developments

Work on developing the second phase of the North Lancashire Bridleway is currently underway, and includes the creation of further local networks linked to the overall long distance route. For updates visit the Forest of Bowland website.

In the Forest of Bowland we are trying to enable access to the countryside for everyone; especially people with disabilities, limited mobility and people with pushchairs. All the family can now experience the unspoiled beauty of the area along trails with fantastic views, wildlife rich hedgerows and through tranquil woodlands and parklands.

. . .

The Forest of Bowland AONB is internationally recognised for its special birds, habitats and wildlife. Birds such as hen harriers, merlin and ring ouzels, as well as many other species can be found in the beautiful hills and valleys.

Birds of Prey

The **hen harrier** is the most important bird species to regularly breed in the Forest of Bowland. Only one word can describe watching a hen harrier hunting or displaying in the spring – breathtaking! Look out for the 'skydancing' display flight, which is a joy to watch.

In common with many other areas, the population of **peregrines** has increased slowly in the Forest of Bowland. In the past only three or four pairs bred annually, but the numbers have now increased to seven or eight pairs each year.

Merlins can be very hard to observe due to their small size and low, dashing flight. The best indication that they are about is their high pitched call. The **short-eared owl** is one of the few owl species that can be seen during daylight hours. It is a specialist hunter of voles, with numbers fluctuating dramatically from year to year in relation to vole numbers.

Waders

In spring, Bowland's farmland and moorland attracts over 6,000 pairs of wading birds such as **lapwing**, **snipe**, **curlew**, **golden plover** and **redshank**. They mainly breed on enclosed farmland next to the moor.

Other birds

The **ring ouzel**, sometimes known as the mountain blackbird is another rare bird in the Forest of Bowland; it is most common around the southern fells.

Other scarce upland songbirds that are also regularly monitored by the RSPB include whinchats, stonechats, wheatears and reed buntings.

Red grouse, a popular game bird, is one of the few bird species to be found all year round on the fells.

Birding locations

- •Roeburndale Woods in the north of Bowland offers good opportunities for seeing oak woodland specialties such as redstart and pied flycatcher.
- •The circular walk around **Stocks Reservoir** to the northeast offers a range of woodland and upland birds. The reservoir itself attracts wildfowl and waders and many passage migrants including the occasional osprey.
- •Abbeystead in the west is one of the best areas for breeding waders on the upland pastures. Lapwing, curlew, redshank, snipe and oystercatcher are all numerous here and golden plover flocks can often be seen.
- •Pendle Hill in the southeast is the place to see migrant dotterel in early May. The open stony ground by the trig point on the eastern summit is the best place to look for these delightful waders on their way to nest in the mountains of Scotland.
- •In the southwest, **Barnacre Reservoir** (not open to the public) is an important staging post for hundreds of migrant whimbrel. The public footpaths on the south side offer opportunities for seeing these birds as they fly in to roost in late April and early May evenings giving their loud piping calls.

Fishing



Bowland is blessed with four of the most scenic and unspoiled rivers in the country, namely the Ribble, Hodder, Wyre and Lune. All are mainly game fish orientated with salmon, sea trout and brown trout being the staple but with a growing popularity for grayling fishing, particularly on the upper Hodder.

For the still water angler Stocks Reservoir is the largest and perhaps the most dramatic of locations being at the headwaters of the Hodder. Rainbows, blues, browns and the occasional wild brownie are on offer, but the smaller venues should not be ignored as they all have their own character and many also offer accommodation. With such a diverse range of fishing and accommodation available, why not turn your fishing trip into a holiday?

Local Produce

The Forest of Bowland is gaining a reputation for fine food and local produce, so why not seek out some local producers and try it yourself? Heritage



Sawley Abbey

The Forest of Bowland is a landscape rich in heritage, much of its beauty is related to the wild nature of the landscape and is a result of thousands of years of human activity.

Many of the features present in Bowland today were established in the post medieval period. Across Bowland there are many fine examples of the stone buildings that were built to replace timber houses between the 16th and 18th centuries, with their characteristic stone mullions, lintels and datestones. There are also sites that survive as isolated reminders of the medieval heritage of the Forest of Bowland, for example the Cistercian monastery of Sawley.

Why not visit some of the places listed opposite and explore Bowland's heritage for yourself? For locations look at the map on pages 4-5.

- Bleasdale Circle The enigmatic Bleasdale Circle, which was excavated in the late 19th century, has been dated approximately to 2200BC.
- 2 Browsholme Hall an historic house and the ancestral home of the Parker Family, Bowbearers of the Forest of Bowland, who have lived there since it was built in 1507.
- 3 Clitheroe Castle The Norman castle keep crowns the bold limestone rock in the centre of town and has dominated its skyline for more than 800 years.
- **4** Cromwell Bridge This ancient packhorse bridge derives its name from the reported crossing by Oliver Cromwell before the battle of Preston in 1648.
- **5** Dalehead Church The graveyard is noted for its wide diversity of plants, and also for the new wind turbine which provides power for the church.
- 6 Great Stone The Great Stone of Four Stones is a large boulder and a relic of the Ice Age.
- **7** Jubilee Tower The tower offers panoramic views over the Lancashire plain and Morecambe Bay and is a popular starting point for fell-top walks.
- 8 Pendle Heritage Centre A restored 17th century and 18th century house featuring exhibitions about the area including the story of the Pendle witches.
- 9 Ribchester Roman Museum A former Roman fort founded in the first century AD. Its ancient history is recorded in the museum which has
- Sawley Abbey A Cistercian abbey; originally home to the White Monks.

many Roman artifacts.

- Slaidburn Heritage Centre -Through displays and an audio-visual presentation, this centre documents local history spanning hundreds of years.
- **Whalley Abbey** A large and important Cistercian monastery. It moved here in 1296 when Abbot Gregory of Norbury and 20 monks arrived.
